After the dinner numerous toasts were offered. Dr. Sidney F. Wilcox, President of the association, was the first speaker. He took for his subject "The President." Dr. John T. Greenleaf, First Vice President of the association, who acted as toastmaster, spoke on "The Toastmaster," telling of his duties in that capacity and quoting the well-known words: "I have gathered a posy of other men's flowers, and nothing but the thread that binds them is my own."
